

The history of our University has been marked by three great figures: St. Jadwiga the Queen, who founded the Faculty of Theology; St. John Paul II, who looked after its survival and established the Pontifical Academy of Theology in Krakow on its foundations; and Pope Benedict XVI, who transformed PAT into the Pontifical University of John Paul II in Krakow.

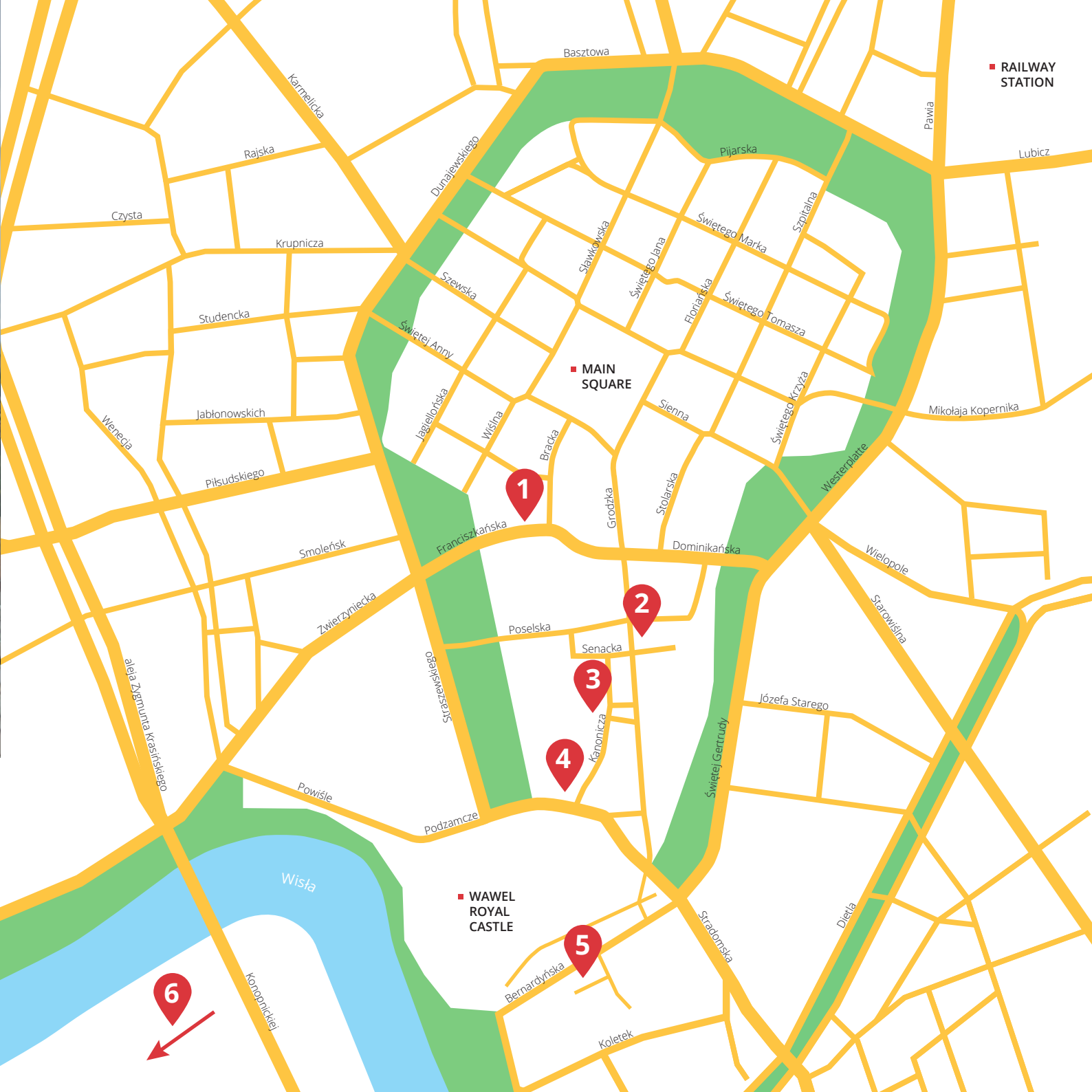

- 1981** Pope John Paul II established The Pontifical Academy of Theology in Krakow with three faculties: Theology, Philosophy and History of Church
- 1999** The Faculty of Theology in Tarnow was established
- 2008** The Faculty of Social Sciences was established
- 2009** The Academy was transformed into the Pontifical University of John Paul II in Krakow

Honoris causa doctorate for Pope Benedict XVI

On 4th July 2015, the prestigious circle of *honoris causa* doctors of the Pontifical University of John Paul II in Krakow and the Academy of Music in Krakow gained splendour by accepting an extraordinary person, His Holiness Benedict XVI. The ceremony of awarding the title of *honoris causa* took place in Castel Gandolfo. Among numerous fine guests, there were Stanislaw Cardinal Dziwisz – Great Chancellor of UPJPII, rectors, professors and students of the Pontifical University of John Paul II in Krakow. The title of *honoris causa* doctor was bestowed upon Pope Emeritus for: great respect for the musical tradition of the Church and understanding of the dialogue between music and faith; showing care and concern for the beauty of Church music and its place in the liturgy of the Church in all position which he held; boldly giving a testimony of the truth which strengthens faith by his life, service, teaching and scientific work as well as efforts to restore its spiritual dimension to Europe; support of actions undertaken to transform the Pontifical Academy of Theology in Krakow into the Pontifical University of John



Paul II in Krakow. It is worth mentioning that it was a unique event owing to the fact that Benedict XVI made an exception to the rule of not accepting any awards since his decision to live in silence and solitude. This exception was made on account of his special relationship with St. John Paul II, Poland and Krakow.

Honoris causa doctorate for Rev. Michał Heller

The 26th title of doctor *honoris causa* of the Pontifical University of John Paul II in Krakow was awarded in the UPJPII Library on 26th June 2016 to Rev. Prof. Dr. Hab. Michał Heller, a professor of philosophy, specializing in philosophy of nature, physics, relativistic cosmology and the relation between science and faith. Rev. M. Heller is employed at UPJPII and the Vatican Observatory, he is also the founder and director of the Copernicus Centre for Interdisciplinary Studies. In 2008 he received the prestigious Templeton Prize awarded for overcoming barriers between science and religion. The *honoris causa* title was bestowed on him for: setting new research directions in relativistic cosmology and quantum cosmology; contribution to the restoration of natural philosophy, philosophy of science and history of science by introducing new interdisciplinary approaches; bridging the gap be-



tween science and faith by indicating the need for dialogue between science and religion in solving problems related to the interplay of science, philosophy and theology; a testimony of faith in the rational dimension by which he was able to reach people of various beliefs; services to the Pontifical University of John Paul II in Krakow.

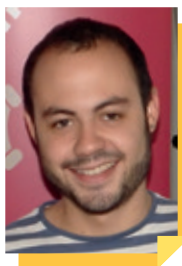

Courses in foreign languages

UPJPII offers a number of courses in foreign languages (mainly in English) to international students. These subjects may also be attended by regular students if they wish to include them as part of their programme of studies. The most cur-

rent list of courses conducted in foreign languages may be found on the website of the Centre for Scientific Research and International Cooperation. Please note that some of these courses may not be opened until there is an appropriate number

of students interested. International students may choose to attend classes relevant to their faculty of choice or other faculties. There is also an option to take part in a Polish Language Course (30 hours, 3 ECTS, 500 PLN).

Selected institutions of the University

The Centre for Scientific Research and International Cooperation (CSRIC)

The Centre assists students and staff (both administration and academic) of the University in the process of application for grants, scholarships, students/teachers exchange programmes, internships etc. The Domestic Section deals with management of statutory funds and matters connected with study visits of the academic staff and funding obtained in Poland. The International Section is responsible for administration and development of international collaboration programmes (Erasmus+, Polish-U.S. Fulbright Commission, CEEPUS, International Visegrad Fund etc.) The total number of Erasmus+ agreements between UPJPII and partner institutions amounts to 67 agreements, mainly with Italian, German, Spanish, Slovakian and Irish universities. Another area of international cooperation includes university bilateral agreements. UPJPII has more than 30 partner institutions worldwide and receives exchange student and academic staff based on the exchange agreements. The university is also a member of international associations

such as the International Federation of Catholic Universities (FIUC), Fédération des Universités Catholiques Européennes (FUCE), University Network of European Capitals of Culture (UNeECC).

Scientific research and education are the most important areas of the university activity. They constitute and determine the scientific and didactic potential of the university and are conducted at six faculties as well as in three specialist laboratories and a state-of-the-art media centre. Scientific research is the foundation for numerous achievements as well as the development of the academic staff. Scientific research is mainly conducted in field of humanities. The research which is carried out includes theology, history, history of the church, philosophy, family studies, religious Studies. Within the social sciences there are ongoing projects dealing with media, pedagogy and psychology. There is also some research conducted in the field of law, predominantly the Canon Law.

UPJPII provides good conditions for carrying out mostly primary research, and also secondary projects. Annually, over 300 research topics are undertaken, some of which are co-financed from grant funds.

Scientific research activity also involves obtaining financial support from the National Science Centre calls as well as programmes organized by various ministries of Poland. It is thanks to the funding obtained in the call organized by the National Programme for the Development of Humanities that the project Establishing Textile Conservation Laboratory could be undertaken. The aim of the research is to create an interdisciplinary database documenting silk textiles in possession of the Church dating back to the 15th-18th century.

Interfaculty Department of Foreign Languages

The Interfaculty Department of Foreign Languages is an interdepartmental unit of the Pontifical University of John Paul II in Krakow. It carries out an educational process on the five faculties and is a didactic body of the university. Languages classes are conducted at all levels (A1, A2, B1, B2, C1, C2) at full-time and extra-mural (weekend) studies of the first and second cycle. The department has at its disposal two modern multimedia labs. Classes are usually conducted in small groups in a friendly atmosphere and take advantage of distance education methods and techniques (e-learning, blended learning) as well as take into account specializations of university courses.

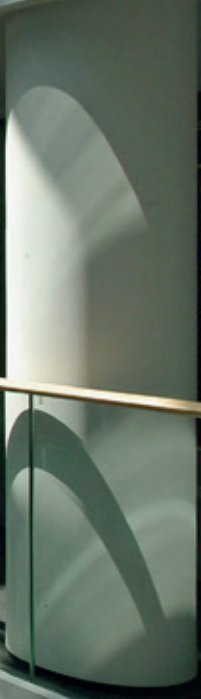

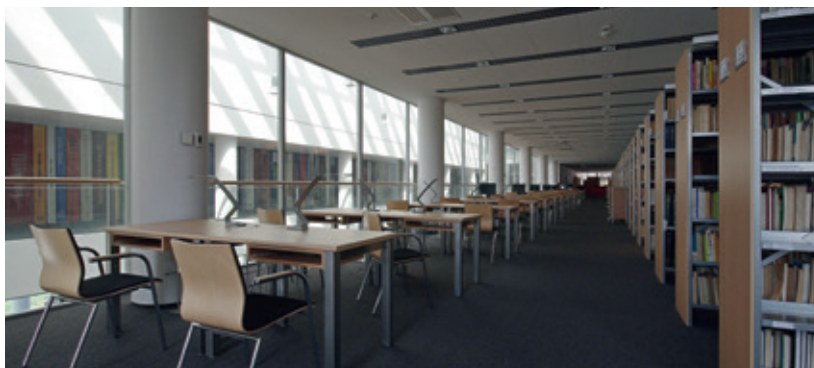

University Library

UPJPII University Library comprises the main building and smaller (faculty, institute, departmental) libraries containing specialist materials. The Library has in its possession a wide selection of materials treating of theology, history of Church,







philosophy, history, pedagogy, psychology, culture, art & literature, political sciences, social sciences and law. One collection in particular is of great significance to UPJPII Library i.e. a collection of books donated by the Holy Father John Paul II from his own personal library.

In order to receive a library card and be granted access to the Library a student only needs to present a valid student card.

The Library's collection consists mainly of books and journals but also includes tapes, databases, electronic and multimedia documents, maps, manuscripts and old prints. The total collection counts over half a million volumes.

Academic Media Centre

One of the most modern media centres in the region with an academic profile. It deals with research and its practical implementation in such fields as journalism, new media, media logistics, public relations, graphics, management in the media. It comprises various laboratories (e.g. e-learning lab, social media analysis lab, photography lab, focus research lab etc.) and constitutes the infrastructure for the two most important media initiatives at UPJPII i.e. JP2TV and Bonus Radio.

JP2TV

The television at the Pontifical University of John Paul II relies solely on the work of students with teachers having only a supporting role. JP2TV functions within three editorial teams: News and Opinion Journalism, Coverage and Documentaries



as well as Small Television Forms. The TV prepares mainly materials informing about current events related with the life of the University and, at the same time, promotes the University values and the spirit of its patron St. John Paul II.

The University has at its disposal a fully professional TV stu-

dio equipped with special cameras, microphones and lighting. Besides the studio, in which TV presenters may master their skills, there is also an editing room.

Bonus Radio

Aside from the television there is also radio. It functions thanks to the work of students of Journalism and Social Communication having at their disposal a professional recording and broadcasting studio, several sound editing stations and modern reporting equipment. The Internet broadcast of the radio started in 2010. Students report the latest university news as well as regional and nation-wide events. The programme format comprises information services and programmes featuring various topics.

Psalmody Choir

The choir, established in 1988, performs during all University celebrations. The ensemble nurtures and inspires student achievement through quality music education and the pursuit of artistic excellence in choral music performance. Psalmody collaborates with Polish Radio Choir in Krakow, The Krakow Opera, the Krakow Philharmonic and the Polish National Television. The choir has given numerous concerts in Poland and abroad.

Saint Hedvig The Queen Foundation for the Pontifical University of John Paul II in Krakow

The Foundation has supported the activities, students, staff and graduates of the University

for over 25 years. Saint Hedvig Foundation promotes and backs individuals whose good ideas and eagerness to act are worth recognition, and for whom UPJPII is something more than a place of work or study.

Organization of the academic year

The academic year is divided into two semesters. Each Semester includes approximately 16 weeks of classes and is ended with an examination period. The winter semester starts from October 1st, ends at the end January and is followed by a re-sit period, while the summer semester lasts from February to June. The summer semester's re-sits are held in September.

There are longer periods of holidays at Christmas (end of December), Easter (varies annually – March or April) as well as one or two weeks in February (interterm break). Other days free of classes are public holidays:

Krakow

A city rich in history and culture

Krakow is famous for its numerous tourist attractions which make each stay here a pleasant time. In the evening you may experience the magical atmosphere of Krakow's pubs, cafés and restaurants in which you may eat well but also relax and enjoy the lovely views.

Krakow, with its population of nearly 800 thousand, has been awarded the reputable title of the European Capital of Culture and is the most frequently visited city in Poland. Krakow has earned its reputation not only thanks to its historical heritage but also by being a home for educated, creative and resourceful people. In Krakow we may find many unique building and the largest market square in Europe. Krakow's Historic Centre is among the first sites chosen for the UNESCO's original World Heritage List.

In Krakow, something extraordinary awaits you each day. The city has a wealth of great plays of the Polish theatre, one-of-a-kind exhibitions in museums and art galleries, cinemas, charming parks, amusing street art performances, cultural festivals, astonishing events and legendary hangouts such as Piwnica pod Baranami.

Most popular tourist sites in Krakow

Cloth Hall (Sukiennice) is, to this day, still crammed with stalls selling amber, jewelry, handicrafts (e.g. lace, woodwork etc.) and other souvenirs. Underneath the Cloth Hall there is an ultra-modern museum showcasing the Krakow's medieval past.





Barbican (Barbakan) is a mighty structure – a fortified gateway leading into the Old Town, one of the few remaining relics of the network of fortifications that once encircled the royal city.

St. Mary's Church (Kościół Mariacki) is one of the most recognized churches in Poland. This ma-

jestic structure is a treasure trove of masterpieces of art such as the stunning altarpiece of Veit Stoss. It is from here that the city's well-known bugle call (hejnał mariacki) is played.

Wavel Royal Castle (Zamek Królewski na Wawelu) is a potent symbol of Polish national iden-



tity, perched on top of the hill of the same name, on the left bank of the Vistula river. Wawel's must-see highlights include the Cathedral, the Crown Treasury and Armoury, State Rooms, Royal Private Apartments, an extraordinary oriental art collection and the hanging bundle of bones which are rumored to have belonged to a local dragon.

Kazimierz – The Old Jewish Quarter, with its narrow streets is one of Krakow's most unique sites. It boasts some of the finest architecture found anywhere in the city, including numerous synagogues and churches but also modern museums such as Schindler's Factory, Galicia Jewish Museum or MOCAK. Centered around Plac Nowy,



Kazimierz has emerged as the city's premier destination for café culture and nightlife.

Divine Mercy Sanctuary in Łagiewniki (Sanktuarium Bożego Miłosierdzia) draws pilgrims from all around the world. The Sanctuary contains the famous painting "Jesus, I trust in You", created with Sister Faustina's instructions as she had seen Jesus appear in one of her visions.

The Czartoryski Museum is best-known for displaying Leonardo da Vinci's *The Lady with an*

Ermine, its collection also includes other magnificent pieces of decorative art, paintings (e.g. two works by Rembrandt), antique sculptures, tapestries etc.

Krakow's Mounds – The city is famous for its mounds i.e. earthen formations erected for commemorative purposes. The most prominent example is Kościuszko Mound, which was also used as a fortified lookout in the past – now houses a museum, others include Piłsudski's Mound, Krakus Mound, Wanda Mound and John Paul II's Mound.

2016 World Youth Day in Krakow

The World Youth Day is an international meeting of young people from all around the world, who gather in one place together with their teachers, educators, pastors and the Pope to celebrate, experience the joy of community and profess faith in Jesus Christ. For a few days, Krakow had become the centre of the world where around 2.5 million

representatives of all continents met in the last week of July 2016. Despite such great diversity, pilgrims from across the globe did not have any problems with communication since, as stated by the chairman of the WYD 2016 Organizing Committee – Cardinal Dziwisz, “everyone spoke one common language – the language of the Gospel”. In the Final





Mass, Pope Francis mentioned St. John Paul II, who must feel happy seeing his beloved Krakow full of youth in high spirits. The 2016 festival of youth in Krakow was an homage of the young Church paid to the Polish Pope, who was the originator and spiritual father of World Youth Days.

The WYD in Krakow was not only a spiritual and cultural event; it was also an enormous logistical challenge. The 2.5 million pilgrims arriving from 187 countries were supported by 250 trams, 580 buses (with over 2 thousand additional journeys), 38 thousand officers of various services, 320 ambulances, 100 medical points and 500 mobile patrols were staffed with nearly 3.5 thousand doctors, nurses and paramedics. Taking all the spiritual, cultural and organizational aspects of this great event into considerations, 2016 WYD in Krakow was a stunning success.









Our patron

St. John Paul II – born Karol Józef Wojtyła, a saint of the Catholic Church. The first non-Italian Pope since 1523. He served in Vatican for 26 years (1978 to 2005), which makes it the longest pontificate in the 20th century and the third-longest in the history of the Church. Very frequently called Saint John Paul the Great, he was one of the most influential leaders of the 20th century as he played a significant role in shaping the history of Europe in the 80s and 90s. Pope John Paul II was known for his great affinity towards the devotion of Divine Mercy, which Jesus revealed to St. Faustina Kowalska. John Paul II, as a supporter of ecumenism and interreligious dialogue, contributed considerably to the improvement of relations of the Catholic Church's with Islam, Judaism, the Eastern Orthodox Church, and the Anglican Communion. During his pontificate, John Paul II beatified and canonised a great number of people as part of his special emphasis on the universal call to holiness. John Paul II is also the person behind the idea of organizing World Youth Days and, together with Blessed Teresa of Calcutta, a patron of the event.

Routes of John Paul II – Places in Krakow associated with the Pope:



Quarry in Zakrzówek – During wartime Karol Wojtyła worked here as a manual labourer (apart from the limestone quarry, Wojtyła also worked at the Solvay chemical factory and a wastewater treatment plant in Borek Fałęcki)

John Tyranowski's house – the place in which young Karol Wojtyła would meet his great spiritual mentor – Servant of God Jan Tyranowski

St. Stanislaus Kostka's Church in Dębniki – Karol Wojtyła conducted his first mass as a priest here

The Jagiellonian University in Krakow – Karol Wojtyła was a student of Polish studies at the Faculty of Philosophy

The Bishop's Palace in Krakow – the seat of Krakow Metropolitan Curia with its famous 'Papal Window' from which John Paul II spoke to the crowds that gathered to see him.

Łonia Park and the Papal Stone at Łonia – a large meadow adjacent to the city centre on which JPII celebrated masses during his visits to Krakow

Divine Mercy Sanctuary and Sanctuary of St. John Paul II – two places of religious cult directly related to John Paul II, located in Łagiewniki district very close to each other.



Other people associated with Krakow



Nicolaus Copernicus – an astronomer and mathematician, best known for the model of Heliocentrism, studied at the University of Kraków (present-day Jagiellonian University) in the Department of Arts, where he obtained thorough grounding in the mathematical-astronomical knowledge.

Jan Długosz – a priest, diplomat and a renowned chronicler of Polish history. His old house at 25 Kanonicza Street now houses the Rectorate of UPJPII.

Giovanni Battista Falconi – an Italian baroque stucco artist, author of decorations in numerous churches in Lesser Poland and Lublin region.

Marek Grechuta – a singer, poet, composer and painter. He is best known for the music genre called *Sung poetry*.

Tadeusz Kościuszko – a national hero, American general – participant of the American Revolutionary War (1775–1783), Supreme Commander of the Polish National Armed Forces, leader of the 1794 Kościuszko Uprising.



St. Faustina Kowalska – a mystic, visionary. Venerated within the Church as the „Secretary of Divine Mercy”. The author of the Diary in which she described her spiritual experiences of meeting Jesus.

Stanisław Lem – a writer, philosopher, famous representative of science-fiction genre. Notable books: “Solaris”, “Return from the Stars”, “Diary found in a bathtub”.

Jan Matejko – a painter, author of historical paintings e.g. “Battle of Grunwald”, “The Prussian Homage”, “Stańczyk”, “John III Sobieski at Vienna”.

Czesław Miłosz – a poet, prose writer, Noble Prize winner in literature, a professor at the University of California, Berkeley.

Sławomir Mrożek – a dramatist, writer and cartoonist, known for his absurdist fiction.

Wisława Szymborska – a poet, translator, essayist and a literary critic, Noble Prize winner in literature, awarded for her precise and ironic vision of the human reality.

Stanisław Wyspiański – a playwright, painter and poet, sometimes called the Fourth Polish Bard (the other Bards are Adam Mickiewicz, Juliusz Słowacki, and Zygmunt Krasiński).

Places worth visiting around Krakow

If you have already seen everything in Krakow itself, the surrounding regions of southern Poland offer an additional bounty of marvelous sights worth exploring.

Tyniec (12 km) – Tyniec is a historic village on the Vistula river, famous for its Benedictine Abbey and limestone Jurassic hills.

Wieliczka (13 km) – is a small town famous for the Wieliczka Salt Mine, which was opened in the 13th century and produced table salt continuously until 2007. It contains incredible statues and chapel carved out of the rock salt.

Ojców National Park (16 km) – Poland's smallest national park, known for its biodiversity and the legend of Łokietek's Cave where, as the legend has it, he hid thanks to help received from a spider.

Puszcza Niepołomicka (20 km) – Niepołomice Primeval Forest used to be the most popular hunting ground for the Polish royalty (area famous for its, now extinct, Aurochs). Nowadays,





home for various species of flora and fauna such as Polish wisent and wild boar.

Pieskowa Skala (27 km) – notable for Pieskowa Skala castle, which is one of the best-known examples of a defensive Polish Renaissance architecture.

Kalwaria Zebrzydowska (40 km) – Kalwaria Zebrzydowska is a magnificent cultural landscape of great spiritual importance. Its natural setting – in which a series of symbolic sites of worship relating to the Passion of Jesus Christ and the life of the Virgin Mary was laid out in the 17th century – has remained practically unchanged. It is still today a place of pilgrimage.



Wadowice (50 km) – the birthplace of John Paul II. The most significant attraction of this lovely town is Holy Father John Paul II Family Home in Wadowice – a modern, interactive museum taking visitors on a tour through Karol Wojtyła's life.

Oświęcim (65 km) – is best known as being the location of the Auschwitz concentration camp during World War II, built and operated by the Third Reich. Despite its disheartening atmosphere, is one of the most popular tourist attractions in the whole region of Malopolska.



Rabka (70 km) – a popular spa town, known for taking advantage of hydrotherapy in local resorts and sanatoriums.

Tarnów (80 km) – one of the biggest cities in the region, known for its market place in the Old Town, with medieval urban layout of streets and tenement houses, some from the Renaissance period

Zakopane (100 km) – the ‘winter capital of Poland’ is visited by over 2,500,000 tourists a year. Tourists

are drawn to Zakopane for its excellent conditions for winter sports: alpine skiing, cross-country skiing, snowboarding, and ski jumping. In the summer, tourists come to enjoy hiking, climbing, and spelunking. Many come to experience góral culture, which is rich in its unique styles of food, speech, architecture, music, and costume. Zakopane is especially popular during the winter holidays, which are celebrated in traditional style, with dances, decorated horse-pulled sleighs called kuligs and roast lamb.

Polish culture and history. The *Buddy System* is an original way of making studying at UPJPII and living in Krakow easier and more pleasant. Incoming international students are contacted by *Buddies* (students volunteers) before their arrival in Krakow and offered assistance throughout the semester. The cultural programme includes such events as:

Orientation Days take place before the start of each semester. Its main purpose is to help students get settled during their first days in Krakow and to learn more about our university, we have designed a special orientation programme with tips, trips, information and lots of opportunities to meet fellow students.

Routes of John Paul II is a full-day tour of places which are connected with the figure of the great Pope – Pole. Erasmus+ students of UPJP II travelled along the pathways of our patron. Some of the points of the trip were: a visit in the newly re-decorated museum of Karol Wojtyła in Wadowice, tasting the famous cream cake „Kremówka” – the favourite cake of JP II; a walk around and inside the Monastery in Kalwaria Zebrzydowska and the old and picturesque village of Lanckorona.

CSRIC, which is responsible for international students, is situated at 3 Bernardyńska Street (50°03'11.0"N 19°56'13.7"E)

If you wish to drive to Poland, you will need the following documents:

- ▶ valid driving licence,
- ▶ vehicle registration certificate,
- ▶ insurance.

In Poland, we drive on the right-hand side, with headlights always on. The speed limits for cars are:

- ▶ 50 km/h (31 mph) in built-up areas during the day (5am–11pm),

- ▶ 60 km/h (37 mph) in built-up areas during the night (11pm–5am),
- ▶ 90 km/h (56 mph) on single carriageways,
- ▶ 100 km/h (62 mph) on dual carriageways or single carriageway expressways,
- ▶ 120 km/h (75 mph) on dual carriageway expressways,
- ▶ 140 km/h (87 mph) on motorways.

Krakow is divided into three parking/entry zones (A, B, C). Zones A and B can be used only by people residing within these zones or holding a special permission. In order to get to the city centre, you need to park your car in the paid Zone C. Tickets can be bought in parking meters (1 hour costs around 3 PLN) using coins, PayPass cards, mobile phone etc. Remember to display



your ticket on the inside of your windshield to avoid a fine (50 PLN).

Public Transport in Krakow

Krakow's public transportation system consist of approximately 30 tram lines and 150 bus lines, including night trams and buses. The cheapest to get around Krakow is to buy Krakowska Karta Miejska (Krakow City Card) for students (47 PLN a month for all lines). It is valid while holding a Polish student card, Euro26 card or International Student Identity Card. KKM cards can be purchased at the following ticket offices:

Minibuses

These are private carriers offering cheap transport locally. The prices vary, we buy tickets at the driver's, upon entering the minibus (van). They stop at regular bus stops or have their own stops (sometimes even stations) near a city's railway/bus station. To make it stop at our stop, we need to flag it down (as if we were hitchhiking).

Taxis

The cheapest way of getting a taxi is to call – the ones waiting at taxi ranks are usually more expensive. The driver is obliged to show you his licence and the counter. Taxi drivers usually know basic English. Please note that night rates are higher.

Weather

When coming to Poland be prepared for all kinds of weather conditions: cold winters and hot summers. The Average temperature in winter is -5°C (min. temp. approx. -20°C), the average temperature in summer is $+17^{\circ}\text{C}$ (max. temp. approx. $+35^{\circ}\text{C}$). Students who choose to study in Krakow in winter are advised to take with them some warm clothes such as: a thick jacket, pullover, hat, scarf and gloves.

Phones

SIM cards can be purchased in kiosks/newsagents or other places marked with gsm operators' logos (Play, Orange, T-mobile, Heyah, Plus, etc.).

In order to call a landline number you need to first dial the city code (e.g. Krakow's city code is 22) and the person's/institutions' individual number. To make an international phonecall, you must dial two zeros, then the country code (e.g. the country code for Poland is + 48), the city code (for landline numbers) and finally the subscriber's number.
